### Bettering the Global Economy During the COVID-19 Pandemic

As countries around the world work to contain the COVID-19 pandemic's health threats, the global economy is also facing unprecedented challenges. Countries have begun the process of vaccinating their populations against the coronavirus, but the process of producing and distributing enough vaccines will take months. Meanwhile, businesses across all sectors have been forced to adapt to the new realities that have accompanied life during a global pandemic.

Meanwhile, the United States is preparing for the inauguration of Joe Biden on January 20 as its new President, and Yoshihide Suga became Prime Minister of Japan in September 2020. Both leaders have pledged to make combatting the COVID-19 pandemic a cornerstone of their platforms. Japan is also preparing to host the Summer Olympics in Tokyo after having postponed the start of the games from 2020.

What strategies can countries adopt during these uncertain times to promote economic resiliency? How can countries such as Japan and the US harness their history of collaboration and strength in technological innovation to strengthen the global economy? What is the outlook for Japan-US cooperation on economic issues under the leadership of Prime Minister Suga and President-elect Biden?

#### The New International Economic Order: The Post-Pandemic Global Economy

The economic consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic will be felt for many years to come. Even after the pandemic is over, the global economy will have changed significantly. Some industries will take years to recover, if they ever fully recover. Other industries may be completely reshaped with the possibility of remote work continuing after the pandemic ends.

Even before the pandemic, major changes were taking place in the global economy. China and the United States were involved in major trade disputes and increased economic and political competition. The United States withdrew from the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP), yet the agreement was revised as the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership and incorporated most of the provisions of the TPP but without American participation. How will the global economy be rebuilt after the pandemic? What will work look like in a postpandemic world? How can countries ensure their economies are more inclusive after the pandemic? How will the United States engage in East Asia economically during the Biden administration?
