Yufuin is a spa resort with a long history that encompasses three hot spring districts in Oita Prefecture on Japan's southern island of Kyushu. While ranked as the country's second largest hot spring source by the volume of water produced, Yufuin also captivates its visitors with natural beauty, paddy fields and its tranguil hot spring town.

Yufuin is particularly famous for its morning mists through fall and winter. The Yufuin valley that extends out from Mt. Yufu (sometimes called the "Mt. Fuji of the Bungo region") can often be seen completely blanketed in mist. Wherever you dig in this valley, a hot spring will bubble up, and poets and writers have favored it for centuries as a simple but very charming hot spring district.

Based on the idea that the unique charm of Yufuin lies in its natural beauty, abundant hot springs, refined culture and comfortable way of life, the local residents and government have joined together to enhance the beauty of the town. A wealth of cultural events and happenings such as music and film festivals are also held throughout the year. In addition to numerous art galleries, there are even studios where you can experience pottery making.
